
Composed of citizens from Central Asia, Anatolia and Balkans, the Turkic American community has a unique place in the United States of America as part of its cultural mosaic.



s the Turkic American community grew in size, so did the scope, number and type of the organizations serving the community. In the beginning, it was only small cultural organizations... Later, private schools, dialog centers and business associations have been formed to serve the community in different areas of their social, cultural and economic life.

While our schools have been educating the youth with ethical standards, values, and knowledge that every citizen of the 21st century needs to become a successful member of their communities, dialog centers have been bringing people of different faiths together for greater respect and understanding. Cultural centers have been organizing events to showcase the richness of our culture, whereas businessmen associations have been strengthening the economic ties between countries and bringing the gap among businessmen of different countries.

In 2009, these organizations gathered under six regional networks, which we called federation or council. However, a broader, nationwide alliance on Capital Hill was still missing to convene them. As a result, the Turkic American Alliance (TAA) has been initiated for better coordination of join efforts among more than 180 organizations all around the U.S.

The Opening Gala Reception of TAA was held on May 12th, 2010 at the Willard InterContinental, bringing representatives of Turkish, Turkic and Eurasian peoples together with 54 Members of the Congress as well as US Senators Richard Lugar, Robert Casey, Frank Lautenberg, Jeff Bingaman, Roger Wicker, Mark Warner and Kay Hagan.

Turkic American Alliance is a non-government, not-for-profit organization established under the SO1(c) 3 lows within the United States with the mere purpose of promoting cultural understanding. The Alliance is established as a broader umbrella organization for federations, councils and similar entities which bear the qualities and share the objectives of establishing closer relations with the Turkic American community and the community at large and also with the members of other ethnic communities in the United States.

URKIC AMERICAN FEDERATION OF SOUTHEAST (TAFS) is a newly established federation whose members consist of Turkish and Turkic organizations in Georgia, Florida, South Carolina, Alabama, and Tennessee and has 22 members throughout the southeast. The members of the TAFS are non-profit and non-governmental organizations improving the IT relationship between Turkic and American communities through educational, cultural, business and other community endeavors.

EDUCATION: As one example of TAFS' educational programs, Istanbul Center in Atlanta, GA organizes its Annual Art and Essay Contest for middle and high-school students. Students are engaged in thinking "outside the box" in creative works of art or essays to better our society. The Contest is a co-curricular activity, and is co-sponsored by the United Nations Alliance of Civilizations (UNAOC) and the Georgia Department of Education.

CULTURE: Every spring, in downtown Ft. Lauderdale, tens of thousands of Floridians attend the Turkish Festival organized by one of our member organizations called the Anatolia Cultural Center. The Festival entertains crowd with contemporary and traditional varieties of Turkish music, performances, and historic Ottoman marchers. Turkish Festivals, such as this one in Florida, continue to grow, attracting more people each year to experience the rich and complex culture of Turkey and Turkic peoples.

BUSINESS: To increase trade between Turkish, Turkic, and US-based companies, one of our members, the Turkish American Chamber of Commerce of the Southeastern recently launched its first Annual Matchmaking Program (February 2010). Business owners and CEOs from more than 15 dynamic Turkish companies visited Atlanta, GA to explore import/export opportunities with local companies.


The Anatolian Cultures and Food Festival was one of the events organized. Los Angeles based Pacifica Institute is the main sponsor of the festival and plans to make this an annual fixture in California. Other participants were the California Turkish American Chamber of Commerce (CATA) and the Organization of Istanbul Armenians (OIA).

A full sensory experience of the history of this region was provided. Visitors literally ate the food, saw the sights and heard the sounds that an ordinary Byzantine or Ottoman citizen experienced thousands of years ago. The festival showcased five major cities and 11 arches including
